How to Protect Artwork and Important Mementos

Conservation framing is framing using the highest quality material designed to protect paper art.

Special techniques and procedures are used to protect the work, and no process that is not reversible is used to leave the artwork in its original state. General components of conservation framing consist of the frame, the glazing, the mat (if used) or spacer, the backing and the hinging. Mats, backing, hinging and glazing must consist of 100% acid free material of conservation quality approved by the Library of Congress. Hinging should be of acid free materials with a water-based activated adhesive. Pressure sensitive adhesives should never be used on paper as these change character over time and may migrate into the paper. To retain the original state of the artwork, it should not be cut, folded or mounted or glued to backing boards.

Conservation framing is generally used for paper artwork and documents, but it should be used when a high degree of protection and preservation is desired for a framed piece, such as family photos, historic documents or photographs and important mementos.

Everything deteriorates over time and exposure to the environment. Conservation framing is designed to minimize deterioration and avoid contributory deterioration by the materials that surround the artwork.

The history of the First UP Church of Rennerdale is rich with Sunday services, adult and youth Sunday school, Vacation Bible School with an average attendance of over 75 and a community youth group. HOW TO REMOVE PET STAINS BEFORE THEY BECOME A PROBLEM

TREAT THE STAIN IMMEDIATELY.

The longer you wait, the more difficult it will be to remove, try and get to the stain while it is still wet.

1. **USE THE RIGHT EQUIPMENT.** First, use a wet vacuum or small carpet spot-ping machine to extract up any liquid.
2. **USE THE PROPER CLEANING AGENTS AFTER** the excess liquid has been removed. Second, apply an Enzyme cleaner, it's the best cleaning agent for urine, vomit, and feces. *Outright* is one that can be bought at the pet store. Follow directions on the bottle, have it on hand for emergencies. You can also dilute 1 cup vinegar with 2 cups water, sprinkle on and extract. The acid base will help remove the fresh urine spot, but won't digest any of the urine like an enzyme.
3. **THIRD, RINSE THE SPOT WITH FRESH WATER.** If you have a spot removal machine, put plain water, no detergents in the tank and rinse the area, follow with several dry passes. If you have a wet vac, sprinkle plain water on the area and extract.

Disclaimer: use these techniques at your own risk. Be aware that pet accidents can damage fibers. Pre-test each solution in an inconspicuous area before using.

Nevillewood Neighborhood Watch Network (NNWN)

Two incidents were brought to our attention since the last newsletter: 1) Two mailboxes that we know of were stolen on Breckenridge on Saturday, November 18 sometime between 7:00pm and 11:30pm. Both mailboxes contained mail which is also missing. After further investigation by the individual neighbors and the Collier Township Police, it appears that this thievery was part of a scavenger hunt consisting of students from Chartiers Valley High School. I did speak with Chief Devin regarding the incident, and he told me that their police department, as well as other nearby police departments within the area, is conducting an investigation to determine the situation. The neighbors had not yet been able to retrieve their stolen mailboxes or the mail that was contained inside. If anyone has any further information that might help the investigation, you are encouraged to contact the Collier Police. Please contact me also if you have any other information that you would like to share with the Nevillewood Neighbors. The theft of mail is a federal offense of which one is held accountable by the law. 2) The second incident involved an attempted break in and robbery in the early morning hours of Saturday, December 15 on Muirfield. The neighbor was awake at the time and in the home. He heard a loud noise in the back of the house and investigated. The suspect had broken the lock and window and entered the home through a basement patio door. The neighbor confronted the man who said he saw someone breaking into the home and was trying to warn the neighbor. He left after being warned. The neighbor notified the police immediately. They were too late, but I did receive an e-mail from Chief Devin on December 18, and he told me they had a suspect and were waiting to contact the neighbor to identify the suspect from a picture line up. As reported from the neighbor, no one was hurt and drawers were disturbed as if the suspect was looking for small objects to steal quickly. Again, if anyone has more information which would help in the investigation, please contact the Collier Township Police and me also if you would like to share the information with the Nevillewood Neighbors.

Thanks to all, including the individuals involved, who alerted the NNWN so we could alert our community through the e-mail network established by the street captains. If anyone has anything they would like to discuss regarding the NNWN, please contact me at the email or phone listed below. In addition, we have established a communication with Chief Devin through email, at this point, where he will send me updates regarding reportable acts of vandalism, theft, break-ins etc within our community such that I can spread the word when he gets the reports. I encourage all to please keep us posted of any incidents which may occur so we can work together to keep our community safe. When in doubt, call the Collier Police. If it appears to be a "non-emergency", then call the non-emergency number listed below. If one needs more immediate action, call 911 and a police dispatch will be called to the situation immediately.

As a reminder during the Winter travel months, if traveling and going to be out of town for any length of time, make sure your mail and newspaper delivery is halted. In addition, lock your doors, make sure garage doors are closed, and keep some lights on timers to look as if someone is home. In addition, ask a neighbor to keep an eye out and drive in and out of your driveway if there is snow. This gives the appearance that someone is home. Have a great remainder of Winter and look forward to Spring!

Caring Community Campaign

Making a difference in the life of a child is not bound by a season or holiday. It is a special moment when you realize a child's life is better lived by a gift you give today. The spirit of giving is alive in Nevillewood Neighbors as we reach out to help another worthy organization in our community – Variety the Children's Charity. Variety was brought to our attention by Nevillewood neighbor, Tilden Bennett. Tilden is a passionate board member of Variety the Children's Charity.

Variety the Children's Charity of Pittsburgh marked its beginning on a cold Christmas Eve in 1928 when a one-month old baby girl was discovered abandoned on a seat in the Sheridan Theatre in Pittsburgh (East Liberty). Variety's vision is to insure that every child with a disability is provided with enabling equipment, assistive technology devices and communication systems, and the opportunity to personally develop and to participate in social, educational, artistic, and recreational activities enjoyed by other children. More than 80 years after it began, the love inspired by one child – Catherine Variety Sheridan – continues to benefit children of all abilities. Variety's work is made possible by the commitment of friends who give generously of their time, talent, and financial resources for the love and well being of children.

Variety's main initiative is its Kids on the Go! Program that provides wheelchairs and other enabling equipment, assistive technology devices and communication systems for children with mental and physical disabilities, ages 21 and under, residing in ten counties of southwestern Pennsylvania. Variety's flagship project is Camp Variety for Kids, an annual summer day camp program at no cost for children with disabilities and their siblings, ages 6 to 21.

Haley, age 11 of Bridgeville, is one example of the many children Variety's Kids on the Go! Program seeks to help. Haley is diagnosed with limb-girdle muscular dystrophy leaving Haley dependent on a wheelchair or confined to bed. Haley's power wheelchair is too heavy and large to transport in a typical car, therefore her Mother is in need of an adaptive van equipped with an automatic ramp. This ramp will allow Haley the freedom to leave her house and get out into her local community.
